RIDE DESCRIPTION

The first stop of today's ride is at Quoddy Head State Park, the easternmost point of land in the continental United States. From there, we head west to Cutler, a charming fishing village that is also home to one of the most powerful very low frequency radio transmitters in the world. We pass through East Machias and Machias, then through Columbia Falls, home of the historic Ruggles House and Wreaths Across America, the non-profit organization that annually makes and places wreaths on all the graves at Arlington National Cemetery. From there, it is a straight shot to Milbridge, where we spend the night on the shore of the Narraquagus River.

Cutler Coast

Few places available to adventurous hikers are as striking as the 12,234-acre Cutler Coast Public Lands, part of the



dramatic "Bold Coast" that extends from Cutler to Lubec. Spectacular views, rugged cliffs and remote pocket coves are accessed by ten miles of trails featuring three primitive tent sites. Fortunate visitors may see a broad range of bird species as well as seals, porpoises and whales surfacing offshore.
